This section allows you to start using your phone by activating your service, setting up your voice mail, contacting customer support, or getting an understanding of how this manual is put together.

Activating Your Phone

When you subscribe to a cellular network, you are provided with a plug-in SIM card loaded with your subscription details, such as your PIN or any optional services available. To Install the SIM card, use the following instructions:


Installing the SIM Card

Note: The plug-in SIM card can be easily damaged by scratches or bending, so be careful when handling, inserting, or removing the card.

To install the SIM card:

- 1. If necessary, switch off the phone by holding down the key.
- 2. Remove the battery. To do so:


Slide the battery lock toward the top of the phone and hold it in that position. Lift the battery away as shown.




3. Slide the SIM card into the SIM card socket, as shown, so that the card locks into position.

Make sure the gold colored contacts of the card face into the phone.

Activating Your Phone



4. To remove the SIM card, slide it upwards as shown.



5. Replace the battery so that the tabs on the end align with the slots at the bottom of the phone.



 Press the battery down until it clicks into place. Make sure that the battery is properly installed before switching on the power.



Charging the Battery


Your phone is powered by a rechargeable Li-ion battery. A travel charger comes with your phone for charging the battery. Use only approved batteries and chargers. Ask your local Samsung dealer for further details.

The travel charger allows you to use the phone while the battery is charging, but this causes the phone to charge slowly.


Note: You must fully charge the battery before using your phone for the first time. A discharged battery recharges fully in approximately 200 minutes.

To charge the battery:

1. With the battery in position on the phone, plug the connector of the travel charger into the jack at the bottom of the phone.



- 2. Plug the charger into a standard AC wall outlet.
- **3.** When charging is finished, unplug the charger from the power outlet then disconnect it from the phone by pressing the buttons on both sides of the connector and pulling the connector out.



Note: You must unplug the charger before removing the battery from the phone during charging, otherwise, the phone could be damaged.

Low Battery Indicator

When the battery is weak and only a few minutes of talk time remain, a warning tone sounds and a pop-up message repeats at regular intervals on the display. In this case, your phone will turn off the backlight to conserve the remaining battery power.

When the battery level is too low, the phone turns off automatically.

Turning on Your Phone

- **1.** Press and hold the **S** key until the phone turns on.
- 2. If the phone asks you to enter a password, enter a password and press the **OK** soft key or the **OK** wey. The password default is '00000000'.

 If the phone asks for a PIN, enter the PIN and press the OK soft key or the <a>P
 Key.

Turning off Your Phone

Press and hold the **a** key until the power-off image displays.

Setting Up Your Voice Mail

Dialing Your Voice Mail Box

To access your voice mail from your keypad, use the following steps:

- 1. In Idle mode, press and hold the 💽 key.
- 2. Follow the voice mail prompts to access messages.

Accessing Your Voice Mail

- 1. In Idle mode, press the **Menu** () soft key to access Menu mode.
- Highlight Recent Calls and press the Select soft key or the a key.
- Highlight Voice Mail and press the Select soft key or the key.
- Highlight Connect to Voice Mail and press the OK soft key or the a key.
- Select Voice Server 1 and press the OK soft key or the key.

Your phone dials the specified number of the voice mail center.

6. When connected, follow the voice prompts from the voice mail center.

Changing the Voice Mail Number

Your SIM card gives you a default service number of the voice mail center. However, you may need to change the number. Use the following procedures to change your voice mail number.

- 1. In Idle mode, press the Menu () soft key to access the Menu mode.
- Highlight Recent Calls and press the Select soft key or the a key.
- Highlight Voice Mail and press the Select soft key or the key.
- Highlight Voice Mail Number and press the OK soft key or the 2 key. Voice Server 1 is highlighted, press the OK soft key.
- 5. Press the Edit soft key or the 🤗 key.
- 6. Use the **S** key to clear the current number, enter a new number and press the **OK** soft key or the **S** key.
- 7. When you are finished, press the 📰 key.

Features of Your Phone



Open View of Your Phone

Note: The display locks in place when opened in Phone mode and does not rotate.



Keys

The following list correlates with the Open view illustration.

1. **Soft key**: Performs the functions indicated by the screen text on the bottom line of the display.

2. Volume/Menu browse key

Mutes the ringer when the phone is ringing. Adjusts the earpiece volume during a call.

In Idle mode, adjusts ringer volume.

In Menu mode, scrolls through the menu options.

3. Dial/Menu confirm key: Makes or answers a call. In Idle mode, recalls the last number dialed or received when held down.

In Menu mode, selects a menu option or stores information that you have entered.

- 4. Voice Mail key: press and hold to automatically dial your voice mail.
- 5. Shift/Asterisk key: Enters the asterisk [*] character for calling features. In text entry mode press to change the character input type
- 6. Charger/PC data link cable jack: Port provided for charging and PC data link cable.
- 7. Microphone: Allows the other caller to hear you clearly when you are speaking to them.
- Space/Pound/Quiet mode key: Enters the pound [#] character for calling features.

In text entry press to enter a space.

In Idle mode press and hold to enter or exit Quiet mode.

9. Alphanumeric keys: Enters numbers, letters, and some special characters

- **10.** Power on/off Menu exit key: Ends a call. Press and hold this key for a few seconds to turn your phone On or Off. While in a the main menu, it returns the phone to idle mode and cancels your input. When you receive an incoming call, press to reject caller.
- WAP browser/Menu confirm key: In Idle mode, launches the WAP (Wireless Application Protocol) browser.

In Menu mode, selects the highlighted menu option or confirms your input.


12. Navigation keys: This key allows you to scroll through the phone menu options and provides a shortcut to phone functions in Idle mode.

In a menu list, the **Up** or **Down** Navigation keys scrolls through the menu options. The **Right** (() Navigation key take you to the highlighted menu option and the **Left** () Navigation key returns to the previous menu.

When entering text, moves the cursor, depending on which side you push.

- Display: The display area where text and graphics appear.
- Earpiece: The earpiece used to listen to audio from your phone.

15. Navigation keys 📲

Use any of the four directional keys to browse menus, sub menus, and lists.

16. Center Select key 🗧

Press to perform the function highlighted in the menu and/or submenu.

Performs the function indicated by the screen text on the bottom of the display.

18. Headset Connector

The headset connector is the input jack for the optional hands-free headset. The headset includes an earbud and microphone in a convenient, lightweight unit so you can talk without using your hands.

Before connecting the headset, gently pry open the cover of the input jack on the phone to expose the connector inside.

19. Text Entry Mode key 📼

The Text Entry mode key determines how you enter text, and numbers. While at any text entry screen, press the wey to change the character input type. Optional input types are ABC and 123 mode.

20. Back Light key 💶

When the Back Light key power saving option is active, the following functions can be performed:

- Press the right side of the **I** key, to dim backlight.
- Press the left side of the
 key, the brighten backlight.

21. Symbol key 🔄

Allows you to enter symbols by pressing the sime key

22. Shortcut keys

Shortcut keys allows you to launch specific applications and are user definable. Listed are the keys and their default settings.

23. Space Bar/Mute/Unmute key/Menu Selection key

🕻 /Space

Allows you to add spaces between words and characters.

Press to Mute/Unmute a call in landscape or phone mode.

Press to set the first page in Landscape mode.

24. Navigation keys \square

Use any of the four directional keys to browse menus, sub menus, and lists.

25. Back/Right Soft key 🔤

The Back/Right Soft key performs the function indicated by screen text on the bottom of the display.

When in menu mode, press to back up one menu level.

26. Backspace key 💽

The Backspace key is used to erase or clear letters, numbers, or characters from the display.

27. Enter key 🔡

Press to perform the function highlighted in the menu and/or submenu.


This key allows you to turn on the speaker phone during a call or to activate the voice dialing feature when in idle mode. Note: This feature only works in Portrait mode. This feature is not functional when the handset is closed or opened in Landscape mode.

29. External LCD

Displays the time and indicates when you receive or missed an incoming call or a message.


Understanding your Display Screen Layout

The display screen has 3 areas. They are:

- Shows the received signal strength. The greater the number of bars, the stronger the signal.
 - Appears when you are connected to the GPRS network.
- Appears when a new text message has been received.
- Appears when a new voice mail has been received.
- Appears when a new multimedia message has been received.
- Appears when there is a new text message and a new multimedia message received.
- Appears when there is a new email message received.
- Appears when you set an alarm to ring at a specified time. For details, see "Setting Alarms" on page 166.
- Appears when you are out of your service area.
- Appears when a call is in progress.
- Appears when you are connected to a WAP service.
- Appears when the Call Forwarding feature is active. For details, see "Call Forwarding" on page 148.
- Appears when you are in the Home Zone if you are subscribed to the service.
- Appears when you are in the City Zone if you are subscribed to the service.
- Appears when you set the Alert Type to Vibration.




Note: The IM icon changes according to the IM provider.

Selecting Functions and Options

Your phone offers a set of functions that can be customized for your ease and specific needs. These functions are arranged in menus and sub-menus, accessed using the two soft keys. Each menu and submenu allows you to view and alter the settings of a particular function.

Selecting Functions and Options



In some functions, you may be asked for a password or PIN. Enter the code and press the **OK** soft key or the **OK** key.

When you access a list of options, your phone highlights the currently active option. If, however, there are only two options, such as **On/Off** or **Enable/Disable**, your phone highlights the option that is not currently active, so that you can select it directly.

Selecting Options

To view various functions and options available and to select the one you want:

- Press the appropriate soft key.
- To select the function displayed or the option highlighted, press the **Select** soft key or the
- To view the next function or highlight the next option on a list, press the **Down** () Navigation key or the **Volume** () key on the left side of the phone, downward.
- To move back to the previous function or option on a list, press the Up () Navigation key or the Volume () key on the left side of the phone, upward.
- To exit the menu structure without changing the settings, press the 🛃 key.

Command Keys

Functions for the soft keys are defined by what appears above each in the display. There are two soft keys, the left soft key 🔊 and the right soft key 🗿.

Soft keys

The roles of the soft keys vary depending on the function you are currently using; the labels on the bottom line of the display just above each key indicate their current role.

Left Soft Key

Some functions of the left soft key are as follows.

- In the Idle screen, press the Menu (
 North key to open the Menu screen.
- When in a menu mode the left () soft key function is Select.

Right Soft Key

Some functions of the right soft key are as follows.

- In the idle screen, press the IM (^(D)) soft key to open the Instant Message Menu screen.
- When in a menu mode the right () soft key function is **Back**.

Clear Key

The **CLR** key **I** is used to erase or clear numbers, text, or symbols from the display. You can also use **I** to return to a previous menu or to return to idle mode from any menu.

 If you enter an incorrect character, briefly press at to backspace (and delete) the character.

To erase the entire sentence, press and hold 💷 .

To back up one menu level, briefly press

End Key

The **End** key **Solution** is used to turn on/off your phone, disconnect calls, and return to the idle mode.

- Press and hold the End key S
 to turn on your phone.
- Briefly press and once to disconnect a call.
- Press 2 to return to idle mode from any menu, or to cancel the last input.

Send Key

The **Send** key **Send** is used to answer calls, dial calls, and to recall the last number(s) dialed, received, or missed.

- Press S once to answer calls.
- Enter a number and briefly press 🔝 to make a call.
- Briefly press similar in idle mode to display a list of recent calls to and from your phone.
- Press 🔝 twice in idle mode to call the most recent number.
- Press S to pick up a waiting call. Press S again to switch back to the other call.

Speakerphone Key

Use the **Speakerphone** key (located on the right side of your phone) to activate or deactivate the speakerphone function before or during a call. Use the volume keys (located on the left side of your phone) to adjust the call volume.

Navigation Keys

Use the directional keys on the navigation key to browse menus, sub menus, and lists. Each key also acts as a shortcut to launch applications. The navigation keys are user-definable.



Back Light

The backlight illuminates the display and the keypad. When you press any key or open the phone, the backlight turns on. It goes off when no keys have been pressed within a given period of time, depending on the setting in the Back Light menu.

External LCD

Your phone has an external display on the front of the phone. It indicates when you have an incoming call or a message. It also alerts you at a specified time when you have set an alarm. The backlight turns on and the corresponding icon appears on the external display.

You can change the display type for the external display in the Front LCD Display menu.

Making a Call

- 1. When the Idle screen displays, enter the area code and phone number.
- 3. Press the 💽 key to place the call.

Ending a Call

When you want to end your call, briefly press the Reg key or close the phone.

Making an International Call

- 1. Press and hold the 💽 key. The + character appears.
- 2. Enter the country code, area code, and phone number and press the set key.

Redialing the Last Number

The phone stores the number of calls dialed, received, or missed.

In Idle mode, press and hold the **S** key to redial the last number dialed or received.

Making a Call from the Address Book

Phone numbers stored in the SIM card or in the phone's memory are accessed in the Address Book. For more information see "Dialing a Number from the Address Book" on page 101.

Frequently used numbers can be assigned a Speed Dial entry. For more information see "Setting up Speed Dial Entries" on page 103.

Answering a Call

When you receive a call, the phone rings and displays the incoming call image.

The caller's phone number or name, if stored in the Address Book, displays.

- 1. If necessary, open the phone.
- Press the soft key or the Accept soft key to answer the incoming call.

When the **Active Folder** option in the **Extra Settings** (See "Extra Settings" on page 140) menu is activated,

you can answer the call simply by opening the phone.

When the **Any Key Answer** option in the **Extra Settings** (See "Extra Settings" on page 140) menu is activated, you can answer the call by pressing any key except the key or the **Reject** soft key.

When this option is off you can only answer the call by pressing the **Accept** soft key or the **Security** key.

Notes:

To reject the call, press the **Reject** soft key or the **e** key. You can mute the ringer by pressing the volume keys on the left side of the phone.

3. End the call by closing the phone or press the sea key.

Note: You can answer a call while using the menu features. After ending the call, the display returns to the function screen you were using.

Adjusting the Call Volume

During a call, you can adjust the earpiece volume using the volume key on the left side of the phone.

Press the A key to increase the volume level and the key to decrease the level.

Missed Calls

Viewing and Calling Missed Calls

When you are unable to answer a call for any reason, a missed call list is created.

The number of calls missed displays on the Idle screen immediately after a call is missed.

To view a missed call immediately:

- 1. If necessary, open the phone.
- Press the View soft key or the explored key. The number for the most recent missed call will be displayed.
- 4. To call the number displayed, press the 💽 key.
- 5. To return to the Idle mode, press the 🔜 key.

Editing a Missed Call Number

- 1. From a missed call view, press the View (
) soft key or the e key.
- Use the Up (
) or Down (
) Navigation key to highlight a call and press the Select soft key or the key.

- Press the Options soft key, highlight the Edit option and press the indicate key or the indicate key.
- Edit the number, and press the Save soft key or the key.
- 5. Choose the New Entry Type and press the Select soft key or the a key.
- 6. Choose the location (SIM Memory or Phone Memory) and press the **Select** soft key or the **Select** soft key.
- 7. Enter a Name and press the **OK** soft key or the **O** key.
- 8. To call the number, press the **S** key.

Deleting a Missed Call

- 1. From a missed call view, press the **View** soft key or the exercise key.
- Press the Up () or Down () Navigation key to highlight the number and press the Select soft key.
- 3. Press the Options soft key.
- 4. Press the **Down** (**D**) Navigation key to highlight the **Delete** option.
- 5. Press the 💼 soft key or the 🧧 key.

Note: You can access the Missed Call feature by selecting Recent calls then Missed Calls.

Call Log

The phone stores the numbers of the calls you've dialed, received or missed. You can access these functions from the Idle or Menu mode.

Accessing the Call Log in Idle Mode

In Idle mode, press the 📢 key. A list of the most recent numbers used, in the order you dialed or received them.

- 1. To dial the number, press the **S** key.
- To view options, press the **Options** soft key. Choose from the View, Edit, Delete or Delete All options.

Editing Numbers in the Call Log

- 1. To edit the number, press the **Options** () soft key, highlight Edit and press the Soft key or the Pakey. Make the edits to the number.
- Press the Save soft key.
- Highlight the new entry type and press the Select soft key or the <u>see</u> key. Highlight the location (SIM Memory or Phone Memory) and press the Select soft key.
- 4. Enter a name and press the **OK** soft key. Press the Option to access more options. See "Using Address Book Entry Options" on page 107 for more details.

Deleting Numbers in the Call Log

- 1. Select the number to delete and press the **Options** (soft key.
- 2. To delete the call, highlight Delete and press the key or the 🧧 key.

Deleting All Numbers in the Call Log

You can delete all, of the records in each call log separately. You can also delete all of your calls at one time.

- 1. To delete all calls, press the **Options** () soft key and select **Delete All** and press the) soft key or the () key.
- 2. Highlight All Calls and press the e key. A checkmark displays in the boxes.
- 3. Press the Delete ()) soft key and press OK soft key.
- 4. Press the Yes ()) soft key to confirm deletion.
- 5. When you are finished, press the \blacksquare key.

Viewing the Call Time

You can check the length of your calls.

- 1. In Idle mode, press the Menu (
) soft key and highlight Recent Calls.
- Select Call Time and press the Select soft key or the
 key.
- 3. Use the Up () or Down () Navigation key to select from the following options:
 - Last Call: shows the length of the last call.
 - Total Made: shows the total length of all calls you have made since the timer was last reset.
 - Total Received: shows the total length of all calls you have received since the timer was last reset.
 - Reset Timers: clears all call data associated.



Note: To Reset Timers you must first enter the phone password and then press the OK soft key or the early key.

Note: The password is preset to "00000000." To change this password, see "Change Password" on page 160.

4. When you have finished, press the **s** key.

Switching to Quiet Mode

Quiet mode is used to stop your phone from sounding when it is inappropriate.

In Quiet mode, instead of making sounds, your phone will vibrate, or do nothing, depending on the Quiet Mode setting. See "Quiet Mode" on page 146 for more detailed information.

Options During a Call

Your phone provides a number of functions that you can use during a call.

Putting a Call on Hold

- 1. To place a call on hold, simply press the Hold soft key.
- 2. To reactivate the call, press the **Unhold** soft key.

Making a Second Call

To make a call while you have a call in progress:

- **1.** Enter the phone number that you wish to dial or look it up in the Address Book.
- 2. Press the second call. The first call is automatically put on hold.

Alternatively,

- 1. Put the current call on hold by pressing the Hold soft key.
- 2. Make the second call in the normal way.

Switching Between Two Calls

When you have an active call and a call on hold, you may switch between the two calls, changing the one on hold to active and placing the other on hold.

1. To switch between the two calls, simply press the **Swap** soft key.

The current call is placed on hold and the call on hold is reactivated so that you can continue conversing with that person.

2. When you want to finish, end each call normally by pressing the **2** key.

Answering a Waiting Call

You can answer an incoming call while you have a call in progress, if this service is supported by the network and you have set **Call Waiting** to **Activate**; see "Setting Call Waiting Options" on page 152. You are notified of an incoming call by a call waiting tone.

To answer a call while you have a call in progress:

- 1. Press the solution key to answer the incoming call. The first call is automatically put on hold.
- To switch between the two calls, press the Swap soft key.
- 3. To end a call on hold, press the **Options** soft key or the end key and select **End Held Call**.

4. To end the current call, press the 🔜 key.

Switching Off the Microphone (Mute)

You can temporarily switch off your phone's microphone, so that the person on the phone cannot hear you.

To switch the microphone off temporarily:

- 1. Press the **Options** soft key or the <u>P</u> key.
- Select Mute. The other person can no longer hear you. Alternatively, press the Spacebar () key to mute the call.

To switch the microphone back on:

- 1. Press the **Options** soft key or the <u>e</u> key.
- Select Unmute. The other person can hear you again. Alternatively, press the Spacebar () key to unmute the call.

Muting or Sending Key Tones

Mute Keys and **Send Key** options allow you to turn off and on the key tones. If the **Mute Keys** option is selected, your phone does not transmit the DTMF (Dual Tone Multi-Frequency) tones of the keys, which allows you to press keys without hearing key tones during a call.

Note: To communicate with answering machines or computerized telephone systems, the Send Keys option must be selected.

Searching for a Number in the Address Book

You can search for a number in the Address Book during a call.

- 1. Press the **Options** soft key or the 🤗 key.
- 2. Select Address Book.

The Address Book entries are listed.

- **3.** Enter the name that you wish to find.
- **4.** If you enter the first few letters of the name, the Address Book entries are listed starting with the entry that most closely matches your input.
- To view the highlighted entry, press the Select soft key or the e key.

For further details about the Address Book feature, see "Section 6: Understanding Your Address Book" on page 97.

Making a Conference Call

A conference call is a network service that allows up to six people to take part simultaneously in a multi-party call.

For further details about subscribing to this service, contact your service provider.

Setting up a Conference Call

- Call the first participant in the normal way. Call the second participant in the normal way. The first call is automatically put on hold.
- 2. To join the first participant to the conference call, press the **Options** soft key and select **Join**.
- To add a new person to the conference call, call the new person in the normal way and then press the **Options** soft key.



4. Highlight Join and press the OK soft key. Repeat as required.

Having a Private Conversation with One Participant

During a conference call, use the following options:

- 1. Press the **Options** soft key and choose **Select One**. The list of call participants appears
- 3. Select Private.

Now you can talk privately to that person. The other participants can continue to converse with each other.

4. To return to the conference call, press the Options soft key and select Join.All of the conference call participants can now hear each

other.

Dropping One Participant

- 1. Press the **Options** soft key and highlight **Select One**. The list of call participants appears.
- Highlight a person by pressing the Up (P) or Down (P) Navigation key, and press the Select soft key.
- 3. Select Remove.

The call with that participant ends, but you can continue to talk to the other participants.

4. When you want to end the conference call, close the phone or press the real key.

VoiceSignal

To start VoiceSignal 2.0, press the key on the right hand side of your phone.

VoiceSignal prompts you to "Say a command" and displays the available commands at the bottom of the screen.



Note: When you first start VoiceSignal, it voice-activates the names stored in your contact list. While reading your contacts, VoiceSignal displays the following message: Please wait while VoiceSignal voice-activates your contacts.

You can change VoiceSignal settings by starting VoiceSignal and then selecting the "Settings" soft key. See the appendix "VoiceSignal Settings" for a description of the settings you can change.

Calling a Name or Number

Use the Call command to place a call. If the number you want to call is stored in your contact list, you can say the contact name and, optionally, which number (home, mobile, etc.) you want to call. If the number is not in your contact list, you can say the number itself.

To Call A Name Or Number

- Start VoiceSignal. You hear "Say a command."
- 2. Say "Call" followed by the name of a person in your contact list, and optionally, the number location (home, work, mobile, etc.) to call, or...

Say "Call" followed by a valid telephone number, or...

Say "Call" by itself to be prompted for a name or number.

Examples:

Call Angela Martinez

Call Tom Stewart at Work

Call Donna Harper's Mobile

Call 781-555-5200

3. After you say a name or number, you might be prompted "Did you say Call?" followed by the first of up to three names or numbers.

4. To confirm a name or number, wait for the beep and then say "Yes."

- 5. You can also choose the correct name or number from the choice list by pressing the number next to the preferred choice, or by selecting it using the phone's Navigation keys. For information on turning off choice lists, or customizing their behavior, see the appendix, "VoiceSignal Settings."
- 6. If the phone recognizes a name that has more than one stored number, it might prompt you "Which number?" Say the label for the number you want, for example "Work," "Home," or "Mobile."



Hints for Using Call

- Wait for the beep before saying the command.
- When saying a name, speak clearly and say the name of a person in your contact list, first name followed by last name.
- When saying a telephone number, pronounce each digit clearly and distinctly but do not pause between the digits. VoiceSignal recognizes the digits one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine, zero, and "oh." It does not recognize expressions such as "one eight hundred." Instead, say "one eight zero zero."



 If VoiceSignal doesn't recognize numbers correctly, try adapting digit dialing to your voice. To adapt digit dialing, choose Digit Dialing and Adapt Digits from the VoiceSignal Settings menu.

Sending a Message

Use the Send Text command to send a text message to a specified name in your contact list or a specified number.

To Send A Message

1. Start VoiceSignal.

You hear "Say a command."

2. Say "Send Text" or...

Say "Send Text" followed by a name or number

You can say...

Send Text (To be prompted to say the name or number)

Send Text to Kevin Harper

Send Text Angela Martinez at home

Send Text to 781 970-5200

3. If you did not specify a name or number, VoiceSignal prompts you

"Say the name or number." Say a name in your contact list, or say a valid telephone number.

4. After you say a name or number, you might be prompted, "Did you say?" To confirm a name or number, wait for the beep and then say "Yes."

You can also choose the correct name or number from the choice list using the phone's Navigation keys.

Hints for using Send Text

- Wait for the beep before saying the command.
- When saying a name, speak clearly and say the name of a person in your contact list, first name followed by last name.
- If you say a name for which there are multiple phone numbers stored, by default VoiceSignal assumes you want to send the message to the mobile phone number. If you want to send a message to a different number (home, work, etc.) you can say the label. For example, you can say "Send Text Chris Wells at Home."

Looking Up a Contact

Use the Lookup command to look up contact information for any person stored in your contact list.

To Look Up Contact Information

1. Start VoiceSignal.

You hear "Say a command."

 Say "Lookup" followed by the name of a person in your contact list.

Examples:

Lookup Angela Martinez

Lookup Tom Stewart

 After you say a name, you might be prompted "Did you say Lookup?" followed by the first of up to three names. To confirm a name, wait for the beep and then say "Yes." You can also choose the correct item from the choice list using the phone's Navigation keys.



Hints for using Lookup

- Wait for the beep before saying the command.
- When saying a name, speak clearly and say the name of a person in your contact list, first name followed by last name.

Opening an Application

Use the "Go To" command to open an application or access a menu on your phone.

To Open An Application Or Access A Menu

1. Start VoiceSignal.

You hear "Say a command."

2. Say "Go To" or...

Say "Go To" followed by the application you want to open or \ldots

Say "Go To" followed by a menu item.

Examples:

Go To (To see a list of applications you can open)

Go To Calendar

Hints for using Go To

Wait for the beep before saying the command.

 To see a list of applications/menu items you can open, say "Go To" but do not specify a destination. VoiceSignal displays a list of valid destinations and prompts you with "Please Choose." You can then say the name of the application you want to open.

Checking Phone Status

Use the Check command to see and hear status information from your phone, including its phone

VoiceSignal

number, current signal strength, network coverage, and battery level.

To Check Phone Status

1. Start VoiceSignal.

You hear "Say a command."

- 2. Say "Check" followed by one of items listed below:
- Check Status: allows you to check signal and battery strength.
- Check Signal: allows you to check signal strength.
- · Check Battery: allows you to check battery strenght.
- Check My Phone #: allows you to check the number assigned to the phone.

The phone reads back the information you requested and also displays it on the screen.



VoiceSignal Settings

Choice Lists

If VoiceSignal is not absolutely confident that it has correctly identified a name or number, it can display a choice list of up to three possibilities, and prompt you to confirm the correct one. Section 3

You can control when choice lists appear by changing the Choice Lists setting to Automatic, Always On, or Always Off.

- Automatic: VoiceSignal displays a choice list when it is not confident it has identified the correct choice from among multiple alternatives.
- Always On: When there are multiple alternatives, VoiceSignal always displays a choice list.
- Always Off: VoiceSignal never displays a choice list. Instead, the application picks the best from among the possible choices.

Sensitivity

In VoiceSignal, "sensitivity" controls the balance between rejecting too much, which means the phone frequently does not recognize names, numbers, or commands, and rejecting too little, which means it frequently recognizes something even if nothing was said.

When VoiceSignal rejects an utterance, it displays a message such as "Please repeat..." or "No match found." If you frequently experience these messages, you might be able to get better recognition by adjusting the Sensitivity setting toward Reject Less.

If you frequently experience false activations

(VoiceSignal detects a wrong match), you might be able to get better performance by adjusting the Sensitivity setting toward Reject More.

Digit Dialing

Use the Digit Dialing menu to adapt digit dialing to your voice.

- Select Location: Lets you improve the accuracy of digit dialing by specifying your current location. Select Other if your present location is not listed, or if you want digit dialing to recognize any number sequence.
- Adapt Digits: Lets you adapt digits, which can improve voice recognition of phone numbers. Adaptation takes about 60 seconds.
- Reset Digits: Erases any digit adaptation you have done and resets digit recognition to the factory default. If you have not adapted digits, this option is grayed out.

Sound

You can customize the VoiceSignal user interface by turning playback on or off for prompts, names, and numbers. You can also change the speed and volume of name playback.

- Prompts: Turns playback on or off for prompts such as "Please say a command."
- **Digits:** Turns playback on or off for digits, for example, when confirming a phone number.
- Names: Turns playback on or off for names.
- Name Settings: Adjusts the speed and volume of name playback.

VoiceMode

Use the VoiceMode menu to adapt VoiceMode to your voice. You must adapt VoiceMode before you can use the VoiceMode option in the text-messaging client.

- Adapt VoiceMode: Lets you adapt VoiceMode, which improves voice recognition of VoiceMode in the text-messaging client.
- Tutorial: Provides a tutorial for the VoiceMode software. This
 option will step you through the functions and options used in
 VoiceMode.
- Reset VoiceMode: Erases any VoiceMode enrollment data that is currently stored. If you have not adapted VoiceMode, this option is grayed out.

Use the About menu to display VoiceSignal version information.

Your phone offers a range of functions that allow you to tailor it to your needs. These functions are arranged in menus and sub-menus.

There are two ways for accessing a menu function.

- 2. Entering the shortcut number of the menu option.

Navigating through the List

- 1. In Idle mode, press the Menu (
) soft key to access the Menu mode.
- Scroll using the Navigation keys to reach a main menu, Settings for example. Press the Select soft key or the
 key to select the menu.
- You can access them by scrolling using the Up (P) or Down (P) Navigation key and pressing the Select soft key or the (key.

If the menu that you have selected contains further options, repeat this step.

 Select an option and press the Select soft key or the key to confirm the chosen setting.

Using Shortcuts

The menu items, such as menus, sub-menus and options are numbered and can be accessed quickly by using their shortcut numbers. For the main menus, you can access them by pressing the number keys (1 to 9), according to their location.

In Use Menu Outline

Simply press the **Menu** (**)** soft key and enter the number of the menu you want.

Note: They may not match the menu number on the phone, depending on the services supported by your SIM card.

For example, accessing the Language menu.

- 1. In Idle mode, press the Menu (

- 3. Press the 🌇 key for Phone Settings.
- **4.** Press the **I** key for **Language**.
- Select a language and press the Select soft key or the
 key to confirm the chosen setting.

In Use Menu Outline

Note: To activate the speaker phone function, during a call press the skey (located on the right side of your handset) and press the Yes soft key to confirm activation.

This section outlines how to select the desired text input mode when entering characters into your phone. This section also describes how to use the T9 predictive text entry system to reduce the amount of key strokes associated with entering text.

Changing Text Entry Mode

When you are in a field that allows characters to be entered, you will notice the text input mode indicator on the display.

For example, the following screen displays when writing a text message.



- 1. To select **T9** mode, press the 👜 key until **1** displays.
- To select Alphabet mode, press the is key until A displays.
- To select Number mode, press the
 key until
 displays.
- To select Symbol mode, press the is key until displays.
- To select VoiceMode[™], press the [™] key until VoiceMode[™] displays.

Using T9 (Predictive Text) Mode

Entering a Word in T9 Mode

1. When you are in T9 mode, start entering a word by pressing the 2 to 9 keys. Press each key only once for each letter.

Example: To enter "Hello", press the **4,3,5,5,** and **6** keys.:



The word you are typing appears in the display. It may change with each key that you press.

- 2. Enter the whole word before editing or deleting the keystrokes.
- 3. When the word displays correctly, go to step 4.

If the word doesn't display correctly, press the **0** key or the **Up** (**D**) or **Down** (**D**) Navigation key to display alternative word choices for the keys that you have pressed.

For example, both "Of" and "Me" have the **6** and **3** keys. The phone displays the most commonly used choice first.

4. Insert a space by pressing the start entering the next word.

If you cannot find the word you want, you can add the word in the T9 dictionary for the next use.

- After pressing the keys corresponding to the word you want to add, press the
 key or the Up (
 Down (
 Navigation key to display the alternative words.
- 2. When there are no more alternative words, the display shows Add on the bottom line. Press the Add soft key.
- If necessary, clear the word using the Rev and enter the word you want to add using Alphabet mode. See "Using Alphabet Mode" on page 85.
- Press the OK soft key or the a key.
 The word is added to the T9 dictionary and becomes the first word for the associated keypress series.

Tips for Using T9 Mode

- To enter periods, hyphens, or apostrophes, press the 1 key. T9 mode applies grammar rules to ensure that correct punctuation is used.
- To shift case in T9 mode, use the
 key. There are three cases; Initial capital
 Capital lock
 and Lower case
 ab.

Using Alphabet Mode

Alphabet mode allows you to enter letters by pressing the numeric key associated with the letter you want to enter. Press the key until the letter you want appears in the display.

Entering a Word in Alphabet Mode


- 1. Press the key (1 to 0) labeled with the letter you want.
- 2. Select the other letters in the same way.

Note: When entering the same letter twice or a different letter on the same key, just wait for a few seconds for the cursor to move to the right automatically, and then select the next letter.

Tips for Using Alphabet Mode

- To insert a space, press the
- To shift case in Alphabet mode, use the **m** key. There are three cases: Capital Lock **AB**, Lower case **ab**, and Initial Capital **b**.
- You can move the cursor by using the Navigation keys. To delete letters, press the set key. Press and hold the set key to clear the display.

Using Number Mode

Number mode allows you to enter numbers by pressing the key labeled with the number you want. When in a text message screen, press the soft key to access the Number mode.

Using Symbol Mode

Symbol mode allows you to enter symbols by pressing the number key associated with the symbol you want.

When in a text message entry screen, press the is soft key to access Symbol mode. The Symbol screen displays the

available symbols for each key. Use the **Up** (P) or **Down** (P) Navigation key to cycle through all available symbols.

You can enter up to 10 symbols at one time. When finished, press the **OK** () soft key or the) key. The VoiceMode screen appears in the display.


Press the **Cancel** (^(D)) soft key to return to text message entry screen.

Your phone will now be in VoiceMode, press the **o** soft key to select a text entry mode.

VoiceMode[™]

VoiceMode[™] from VoiceSignal Technologies is the fastest, and most convenient way to compose text messages on a mobile phone. VoiceMode lets you use your voice to dictate words, names, punctuation, and even abbreviations (like LOL and TTYL), instead of keying them in by hand.

VoiceMode is seamlessly integrated into your phone's text messaging application, so you can switch from keypad text entry to voice dictation with a push of a button.



To use VoiceMode when composing a text message, you simply hold down the voice button of your phone. A listening icon not flashes to show that VoiceMode is listening for your voice. Start dictating, pausing briefly between each word. While you are dictating, you will see the words recognized appear in your message. These initial words that appear on the screen are VoiceMode's first guess at what you dictated. When you release the record button, VoiceMode automatically makes corrections based on the context of the phrase, and display its best guess of the words recognized.

Adapting VoiceMode

Before you can use VoiceMode, you must adapt it to recognize the special characteristics of your voice. The adaptation process takes a few minutes and involves reading a list of 122 words, one word at a time.

To Adapt VoiceMode

- Find a quiet place for adaptation.
- 2. Start VoiceSignal by pressing the key located on the right side of your phone.

- 3. Press the **Settings** soft key or the 🤷 key.
- Select VoiceMode. Highlight Adapt VoiceMode and press the Select soft key or the eleven key. The Adapt VoiceMode screen displays to verify the start of the adaptation.
- 5. When you are ready to start adaptation, select OK. (If you or someone else has completed adaptation earlier, the phone will ask if you want to start from scratch or continue adapting the existing models. Select Yes to discard existing adaptation data and start from scratch, or select No to continue adapting the existing data.)
- 6. Wait for the beep and then say each word as it appears on the screen. Speak each word clearly and distinctly, using a normal tone and volume. If the adaptation process doesn't detect a word, it will prompt you again to speak the same word.
- If you want to take a break, press the Pause soft key to pause the adaptation process. When paused, continue adaptation by pressing the Continue key.
- After you say all 122 words, the phone will adapt VoiceMode to your voice. This process will take about one minute to complete.

Note: If you press Cancel during adaptation, the phone will ask if you want to save the adaptation data. Press Yes to save the data, or No to exit without saving. If you do not complete adaptation, be sure to go back and finish adapting to improve dictation recognition.

If you ever need to reset adaptation to its original state, use the following procedure.

To Reset Adaptation

- 1. Start VoiceSignal by pressing the key located on the right side of your phone.
- 2. Press the Settings soft key or the 🤗 key.
- 3. Select VoiceMode and highlight Reset VoiceMode. Press the Select soft key or the a key.
- 4. When prompted, press **OK** to reset adaptation, or **Cancel** to exit without resetting the adaptation data.

Using VoiceMode

After adapting VoiceMode, you can start using it when composing text messages.

To Start VoiceMode

- In Idle mode press the Menu (
 Soft key to access Menu Mode. Highlight Messaging and press the Select soft key or the
 key.
- Select Create New message and highlight Text Message. Press the Select soft key or the a key.
- 3. Press the Device Key to select VoiceMode. A VoiceMode Tutorial message appears. Press the View soft key to proceed or Cancel to return.
- To activate VoiceMode, press and hold the ⇒ button on the right side of the phone.

VoiceMode beeps and animates the Listening icon at the top right of the screen to indicate that you can begin speaking.

To dictate text using VoiceMode

 Speak clearly and pause distinctly between each word. (Double-click the audio link, below, to hear an example of how to dictate text.)
 "When... speaking... COMMA... pause... briefly...

between... each... word... PERIOD"

2. When you are done or want to pause, release the button to stop the phone from listening. Although the phone is not listening, the text message application will remain in VoiceMode. To switch to another mode, press the provide soft key.

Using VoiceMode Advanced Features

Using Choice Lists

Every time you dictate a word using VoiceMode, it maintains a list of alternatives that closely resemble the recognized word. These choice lists let you quickly change a word that was not recognized correctly.

To use choice lists

 Use the Left (
) or Right (
) Navigation keys to highlight a word you want to change, and then press the key.

A choice list appears with possible matches for the word.



 Use the Up () and Down () Navigation key to highlight a word, then press the Select soft key or the key.

Spelling a Word

If a word is not recognized and does not appear in the choice list, it might be because that word is not in the dictation dictionary. In this case, you can spell out the word manually. When you spell a word that is not part of the dictation dictionary, the new word is added to the dictionary. This enables VoiceMode to recognize the new word the next time it is spoken.

To Spell a Word

- 1. Display the choice list for the word you want to spell out.
- 2. Select [Spell Word].

You will see an empty text box, where you can manually spell the word using the keypad.

3. As you start typing letters, you will see words with similar spellings appear below the text box. Use the up and down Navigation keys to scroll the dictionary. While scrolling the dictionary, the words will populate the text box. Use the reaction key to edit the entry in the text box.

Changing the Text Case

When using VoiceMode, you can specify the case (all caps, initial caps, or lower case) for text that you dictate. By default, VoiceMode formats text according to the context of the words in the message. For example, words following periods are capitalized.

To Specify the Case of the Next Dictated Word

1. In VoiceMode, press the 🛐 key.

The VoiceMode icon changes to **VOICEMODE** (all caps). Press the **(a)** key again to change the text case icon to **Voicemode** (initial caps), or **voicemode** (lower case).

2. Dictate the word you want to appear in the specified case.

Changing the text case will apply to all the words spoken directly after specifying the case. You must manually change the case back to the default.

Entering Punctuation Characters

This section allows you to manage your daily contacts by storing their name and number in your Address Book. Address Book entries can be sorted by name, entry, or group.

Adding a New Address Book Entry

There are two ways to store a number:

- Entering the number in Idle mode and press the Save soft key or the key.
- Use the New Entry option in the Address Book menu.

Storing a Number in Idle Mode

1. Enter the number you want to store.

Note: If you make a mistake while entering a number, correct it using the key.

- 2. When you are sure that the number is correct, press the **Save** soft key or the **Save** key.
- Use the Left () or Right () Navigation key to highlight an icon to identify the category in which the number is to be stored and press the Select soft key or the explored key.

The following categories are available:

- 📑 : Mobile phone number
- 🚛 : Office number
- 📇 : Home number
- Select a memory location, choose SIM Memory or Phone Memory and press the Select soft key or the key.

Note: When you change phones, any numbers stored in your SIM card memory are automatically available with the new phone, whereas any numbers stored in the phone's memory will need to be re-entered.

- Enter a name. For further details about how to enter characters, see "Section 5: Entering Text" on page 81.
- 6. Press the **OK** soft key or **OK** key to store the name and number.

After storing, the phone displays the phone number and name you just stored.

- 7. To dial the number, press the 💽 key or the 🤗 key.
- To use the entry options, press the **Options** soft key. For further details see "Using Address Book Entry Options" on page 107.
- 9. To return to the Idle screen, press the 📰 key.

Storing a Number Using the New Entry Option

- 1. In Idle mode, press the Menu () soft key to access the Menu mode and select Address Book.
- Select New Entry. The New Entry Type screen appears in the display. Select from the following entry types
 - Image: Mobile phone number
 - 🐠: Office number
 - 📇 : Home number
 - 🦗 : Email Address

Note: Follow standard email address formats when entering an email address. For example, *someone@providersname.com*. An error message displays when an email address has been entered incorrectly.

3. Using the Left () or Right () Navigation key, highlight an entry type for the number to be stored and press the Select soft key or the () key.

4. Select a memory location, either SIM Memory or Phone Memory.

Note: When you are saving an Email address, SIM Memory is not available.

- 5. Enter a name and press the OK soft key.

 To add the number to an existing name, select the one you want from the list.
- 6. Enter the number or address you want to store and press the **Save** soft key or the early key.
- **7.** After storing, the phone displays the phone number and name you just stored.
- **8.** Press the **S** key to dial the number.

Storing Your Phone Number

To store your own phone number(s), use the following steps:

- 1. In Idle mode, press the Menu () soft key to access Menu mode and select Address Book.
- Select Own Number and press the Select soft key or the key.
- Use the Up (
) or Down (
) Navigation key to select location Number 1 and press the Edit soft key or the key.
- 4. Enter the number and press the **OK** soft key or the a key.

Pauses

Enter the name and press the OK soft key or the key.

Pauses

When you call automated systems (like banking services and voice mail) you are often required to enter a password or account number. Instead of manually entering the numbers each time you can store the numbers in your Address Book along with special characters called pauses.

Enter the number you want to store, press and hold the key to insert a two-second pause. A "**P**" appears in the display.

Note: You can enter multiple two-second pauses to extend the length of the pause. For example two consecutive pauses equates to a pause time of four seconds.

Dialing a Number from the Address Book

Once you have stored phone numbers in the Address Book, you can dial them easily and quickly by using the location numbers that were assigned to them in the Address Book in the order they were saved. Section 6

Note: If you cannot remember a location number, you must go into the Search option in the Address Book menu to search for the entry by name.

Dialing a Number from the SIM Card

- In Idle mode, enter the location number for the phone number you want to dial and press the skey. The number associated with the location number displays.
- 2. You can press the Up (P) or Down (P) Navigation key to view other numbers that have been saved on your SIM card.
- 3. Press the **Dial** soft key or the **S** when you have selected the number you want.

Dialing a Number from the Phone's Memory

- 1. In Idle mode, press and hold the 💽 key. A + appears.
- Enter the location number of the phone number you want and press the set key. The number associated with the location number displays.
- You can press the Up (P) or Down (P) Navigation key to view other numbers that have been saved in your Phone memory.
- 4. Press the **Dial** soft key or the selected the number you want.

Speed Dialing

You can assign up to 8 phone numbers from the Address Book that you use frequently to the number keys (2 to 9). You can then dial them easily whenever you want, simply by pressing and holding the associated number key.

Setting up Speed Dial Entries

- 1. In Idle mode, press the Menu (I) soft key to access Menu mode.
- Select Address Book and press the Select soft key or the a key.
- Use the Up (
) or Down (
) Navigation key to highlight Speed Dial and press the Select soft key or the key.
- Select the Speed Dial location you wish to assign a number and press the OK soft key or the <a>(2) key.

Note: If you have already assigned a number to the speed dial location, the **Options** soft key replaces the **OK** soft key.

Note: Memory location 1 is reserved for your Voice Mail server number.

- 5. Highlight a name from the Address Book list or enter the first few letters of the name associated with the number you would like to assign to the Speed Dial location and press the Select soft key or the enter key.
- Select a number, (if there is more than one number associated with the address book entry) and press the Select soft key.

- 7. The number displays in the speed dial list.
- 8. When you have finished, press the 💽 key.

Editing the Speed Dial List

You can edit the speed dial list by changing the number assignment or deleting all of the entries on the speed dial list.

Changing a Number Assigned to a Key

- 1. In Idle mode, press the **Menu** () soft key to access Menu mode.
- 2. Select Address Book and press the Select soft key or the a key.
- Use the Up (
) or Down (
) Navigation key to highlight Speed Dial and press the Select soft key or the key.
- 4. Select the Speed Dial location you want to change and press the **Options** soft key or the **Options** key.
- 5. Select Change and press the 👜 key or the 🤷 key.

Note: At this point press the 🔜 key to return to the Speed Dial list.

- 6. Use the Up () or Down () Navigation key to highlight a name from the Address Book list or enter the first few letters of the name associated with the number you would like to assign to the Speed Dial location and press the Select soft key or the key.
- Press the Select soft key or the a key to save number. The new number or name displays in the Speed Dial location.

8. When you have finished, press the 📰 key.

Deleting Speed Dial Entries

- 1. In Idle mode, press the Menu (I) soft key to access Menu mode.
- 2. Select Address Book and press the Select soft key or the a key.
- Use the Up () or Down () Navigation key to highlight Speed Dial and press the Select soft key or the key.
- Select the number assigned to the Speed Dial location you want to delete and press the **Options** soft key or the key
- Select Delete and press the Rev.
 Alternatively, if you want to delete all speed dial entries, select Delete All and press the Rev.
- 6. Press the Yes soft key to confirm the deletion.
- 7. When you have finished, press the **s** key.



Finding Address Book Entries

After storing numbers in the Address Book, you can search for them in two ways; by name and by caller group.

Finding a Number by Name

- 1. In Idle mode, press the Menu () soft key to access Menu mode.
- Select Address Book and press the Select soft key or the e key.
- 3. Select Search and press the Select soft key or the a key. You are asked to enter a name.
- **4.** Enter the first few letters of the name that you want to find.

The Address Book entries are listed, highlighting the entry that most closely matches your input.

- 5. To view the highlighted entry, press the **Select** soft key or the extension key. Press the extension key to return to Address Book entries.
- To select a different entry, press the Up () or Down () Navigation key until the entry you want highlights.

Instant Messenger (IM) is a way of sending short, simple messages that are delivered immediately to users online at the moment.

Before using this feature, you need to subscribe to a messenger service. For further details, contact your service provider.

Note: Your phone is set to use your service provider's messenger service by default. You can change the configurations for Instant Messenger, such as the default community or auto sign on.

Start Your Messenger

Note: The d307 handset supports the following Instant Messaging Applications: AIM, ICQ, and YAHOO.



- Profile: you can select a connection profile to be used for sending and receiving MMS messages.

Push Message

The following options are available:

- Receive: you can select whether the phone receive or reject push-messages from the WAP server. Choose from Never, Always, or Only White List.
- White List: allows only users on your contact list to push messages.

Broadcast

The following options are available:

- Receive: allows you to enable or disable the reception of broadcast messages.
- Channel List: allows you to indicate the channels from which you wish to receive broadcast messages. The following options are available:
 - Select: use to enable or disable channels on the list by marking or unmarking them, respectively. A check mark displays in front of each selected channel.

This section explains the menu navigation for your phone. It also includes an outline of all the available menus associated with your phone.

Time & Date

Allows you can change the settings for the time and date that appears in the display.

- 1. In Idle mode, press the **Menu** (I) soft key to access Menu mode.
- 2. Select Settings and highlight Time & Date. Press the Select soft key or the a key.
- **3.** Select a menu and then change the setting. If the menu has submenus, repeat as necessary.
- 4. When you have finished, press the 💽 key.

Set Time

You can enter the current time. You can choose the time format in the **Time Format** menu.

Note: Before setting the time, you must specify your time zone in the World Time menu.

Set Date

You can enter the month, day, and year.

Time Format

You can change the time format to 12 Hours or 24 Hours.

Auto Update

You can receive time information from your service provider's network.

• Off: you need to manually set the time and date according to the current time zone using the Set Time menu.

Phone Settings

- On: the phone automatically updates the time and date according to the current time zone using the network service.
- Confirm First: the phone asks for a confirmation before the update.

Note: Automatic updates of time and date does not change the time you have set for alarm settings or calendar memos.

Phone Settings

To customize the settings for your phone use the following steps:

- 1. In Idle mode, press the Menu (
) soft key to access Menu mode.
- Select Settings and highlight Phone Settings. Press the Select soft key or the <a>Press
- **3.** Select a menu and then change the setting. If the menu has submenus, repeat as necessary.
- **4.** When you have finished, press the **s** key.

Language

You can select a display language. When the language option is set to **Automatic**, the language is automatically selected according to the language of the SIM card used.

Note: Depending on your country, service provider, or software version of the phone, the **Automatic** option may not display.

Greeting Message

This menu allows you to set a greeting to be displayed briefly when the phone is switched on.

Short Cut

The Navigation keys can be used as shortcut keys. In Idle mode, they allow you to access specific menus directly. To assign a shortcut to a key:

- 1. From the Phone Settings menu, select Short Cut.
- 2. Select the key to be used as a shortcut key.
- 3. Select the menu to be assigned to the key.

Note: To deactivate a shortcut key, select the None option.

Extra Settings

You can turn the automatic redialing or answering features on or off.

- 1. To turn a feature on, press the **On** soft key or the a key. A check mark displays in front of the option.
- To turn a feature off, press the Off soft key or the key. The check mark no longer displays.

The following options are available:

- Auto Redial: when this option is checked, the phone makes up to ten attempts to redial a phone number after an unsuccessful call.
- Active Folder: when this option is checked, incoming calls are answered when opening the folder.

Note: The interval between call attempts varies.

• Anykey Answer: when this option is checked, you can answer an incoming call by pressing any key, except the

key or the **Reject** soft key. To reject the calls, press the key or the **Reject** soft key.

When this option is unchecked, you must press the sey or **Accept** soft key to answer a call.

TTY Settings*

TTY (also known as a TDD or Text Telephone) is a telecommunications device that allows people who are deaf or hard of hearing, or who have speech or language disabilities, to communicate via a telephone.

Note: The TTY is automatically detected when TTY adaptor is inserted into your phone.

Display Settings

To customize the settings for the display use the following steps:

- 1. In Idle mode, press the Menu (I) soft key to access Menu mode.

Wallpaper

This menu allows you to change the background image in Idle mode. The following options are available:

- Shop Graphics
- Default Wallpapers
- Downloaded Graphics

Note: You can scroll to other images by pressing the Up (P) or Down (P) Navigation key from the image preview screen.

Front LCD Display

This menu allows you to adjust the external LCD clock display and LCD Brightness.

You can choose from Digital Clock or Analog Clock.

You can set the front LCD brightness by using the Left (IN) Navigation key to decrease brightness or the Right (IN) to increase brightness. Press the OK soft key to save changes.

Text Display

This menu allows you to specify whether or not the phone displays the time and date on the Idle screen. Choose Enable or Disable.

Text Color

This menu allows you to select the color of the text to be displayed on the Idle screen. This option is available when the text display is enabled. Use the **Up** (P) or **Down** (P) Navigation key to make your selection.

Dialing Font Color

This menu allows you to select numeric font color that appears in the display when making a call. Choose basic or rainbow.

Menu Style

This menu allows you to select the menu display style. You can choose either **Grid Style**, **Page Style**, or **Bar Style**.

Back Light

You can select the length of time the backlight is on. The backlight turns on when you press a key, when you open the phone or you receive a call or message, and remains on for the specified length of time.

Graphic Logo

This menu allows you to display a service provider's logo when using another service provider's SIM card. This menu is SIM specific.

- Off: the service provider's name displays in the Idle mode.
- **On**: the service provider's logo stored on your SIM card displays in Idle mode; if no logo has been stored, the service provider's name appears in the display.

You can customize the settings related to various sounds for the phone, such as the call ringer, key tone, power on/ off tone, folder tone, and so on.

- 1. In Idle mode, press the Menu () soft key to access Menu mode.
- 2. Select Settings. Highlight Sound Settings and press the Select soft key or the a key.
- **3.** Select a menu and then change the setting. If the menu has submenus, repeat as necessary.
- **4.** When you have finished, press the **s** key.

Ring Tone

This menu allows you to select a ring melody. You can choose between many different melodies and tones. If you have downloaded sounds from the Internet, you can access them in this menu.

- Shop Ringtones: allows you to access the web site preset by your service provider to download melodies. Once you have downloaded melodies, they are saved in the Audio folder.
- Default Ringtones: allows you to choose from preset ringtones provided by your service provider.
- **Downloaded Ringtones**: allows you to choose from ringtones you have downloaded.
- **Ring Volume**: allows you to adjust the ring volume to one of 5 levels. Use the Up () or Down () Navigation keys or the Up and Down keys on the side of the phone to adjust the volume.

• Alert Type: allows you to specify how you are to be informed of incoming calls. The following options are available:

- Melody: the phone rings using the ring melody selected in the Ring Tone menu.
- Vibration: the phone vibrates but does not ring. The 📔 icon appears in the top line of the display.
- Vibration + Melody: the phone first vibrates three times and then starts ringing. The phone first vibrates three times and then starts ringing. The phone first vibrates three times and then starts ringing.

Keypad Tone

This menu allows you to select the **Tone Type** and **Volume** of the tone that the phone sounds when you press a key. To turn off the sound, select **Off**.

If the **Tone Type** option is set to **off**, your phone does not transmit the DTMF (Dual Tone Multi-Frequency) tones of the keys, which allows you to press keys without hearing key tones during a call.

Note: To communicate with answering machines or computerized telephone systems, a Tone Type must be selected.

Message Tone

This menu allows you to select how the phone informs you that a new SMS and MMS message has been received.

For each message tone, the following options are available:

- Tone: allows you to select a message tone.
- Mode: allows you to select a type of message alert.

- Off: the phone does not sound when you have received a SMS message.
- Tone: the phone sounds the selected message tone.
- Vibration: the phone vibrates.
- **Repetition**: you can select how often the phone informs you of a new message.
 - Once: the phone alerts you to a new message just once at the time of its receipt.
 - Periodic: the phone alerts you to a new message every 2 minutes until you open the message.

Power On/Off

This menu allows you to select the melody that the phone sounds when it is switched on and off. To turn off the sound, select **Off**.

Folder Tone

This menu allows you to select the tone the phone sounds when you open or close the phone. To turn off the sound, select **Off**.

Alerts on Call

The following options are available:

- Off: the phone doesn't actively alert you to incoming messages or alarms. It only displays the corresponding notification.
- **On**: the phone alerts you with a beep and displays the corresponding notification.

Quiet Mode

This menu allows you to select how you are notified when silent mode is activated. You can select Vibration All or Silent All.

Sound Settings

The following options are available:

- Vibration All: the phone will vibrate in silent mode.
- Silent All: the phone mutes the sound of an incoming call in silent mode.

In idle mode press and hold the press key, to activate or deactivate Silent All or Vibration All.

Alternatively, in idle mode press the Volume/Menu Browse key (See "Open View of Your Phone" on page 21) until the **Silent All** or **Vibration All** message appears in the display. The icon associated with the setting appears in the top line of the display.

When **Silent All** is active on your handset the \triangleleft icon appears in the top line of the display.

- Minute Minder: sets whether or not the phone beeps every minute during an outgoing call to keep you informed of the length of your call.
- **Connect Tone**: sets whether or not the phone beeps when your call is connected to the system.

Network Services

You can customize the settings for network features, such as call forwarding, call barring, and call waiting.

- 1. In Idle mode, press the Menu () soft key to access Menu mode.
- 2. Select Settings and highlight Network Services. Press the Select soft key or the a key.
- **3.** Select a menu and then change the setting. If the menu has submenus, repeat as necessary.
- 4. When you have finished, press the 💽 key.

Call Forwarding

This network service enables incoming calls to be rerouted to the number that you specify.

For example, you may wish to forward your business calls to a colleague while you are on vacation.

- 1. From the Network Services menu screen, select Call Forwarding.
- 2. Select one of the following call forwarding options.
- Forward Always: all calls are forwarded
- Busy: calls are forwarded when you are already on another call
- No Reply: calls are forwarded when you do not answer the phone.

- Unreachable: calls are forwarded when you are not in an area covered by your service provider or when your phone is switched off.
- Cancel All: all call forwarding options are canceled.
- **3.** Select the type of calls, **Voice Calls** or **Data Calls**. The current status displays. If the option has already been set, the number to which the calls are forwarded displays.

4. Press the Activate soft key or the 🤗 key.

Enter the number to which the calls are to be forwarded and press the **OK** soft key ore the **e** key.

To enter an international code, press and hold the **0** key until the **+** sign appear in the display.

5. If you selected **No Reply** in step 1, select the time delay the network waits before forwarding a call.

The phone sends your settings to the network and the network's acknowledgement displays.

Call Barring (SIM dependent)

The call barring network service allows you to restrict your calls. This option is SIM dependent and requires a subscription. For more information, contact your service provider.

Setting Call Barring Options

- 1. From the Network Services menu screen, select Call Barring.
- 2. Select one of the following call barring options:
 - All Outgoing: calls cannot be made.
 - International: international calls cannot be made.
 - International Except to Home: when abroad, calls can be made only to numbers within the current country and to your home country, which is the country where your home network provider is located.
 - All Receiving: calls cannot be received.
 - Receiving While Abroad: calls cannot be received when you are using your phone outside of your home country.
 - Cancel All: all call barring settings are deactivated; calls can be made and received normally.
 - Change Barring Password: you can set and change the call barring password obtained from your service provider.
- 3. Select the type of calls, Voice Calls or Data Calls.
- 4. Press the Activate soft key or the <u>9</u> key.
- 5. Enter your call barring password supplied by your service provider.

The phone sends your settings to the network and the network's acknowledgement displays.

Network Services

Deactivating Specific Call Barring Settings

- 1. From the Network Services menu screen, select Call Barring.
- 2. Select the call barring option to be deactivated.
- 3. Select the type of calls to which this option applies.
- 4. Press the **Deactivate** soft key or the <u>each</u> key.
- **5.** Enter your call barring password supplied by your service provider.

The phone sends our settings to the network and the network's acknowledgment displays.

Changing the Barring Password

- 1. From the Network Services menu screen, select Call Barring.
- 2. Select Change Barring Password.
- Enter the current password and press the OK soft key or the a key.
- 4. Enter a new password and press the **OK** soft key or the enterna key.
- Enter the new password to confirm and press the OK soft key or the e key.

The phone sends your settings to the network and the network's acknowledgement displays.

Call Waiting

This network service informs you when someone is trying to reach you during another call.

You can specify individual call waiting options for voice calls and/or data calls.

Setting Call Waiting Options

- 1. From the Network Services menu screen, select Call Waiting.
- Select the type of calls, Voice Calls or Data Calls. The screen informs you whether call waiting is activated or deactivated.

Press the **Activate** soft key or the e key to activate the call waiting feature.

The phone sends your settings to the network and the network's acknowledgement displays.

Deactivating Call Waiting Settings

- 1. From the Network Services menu screen, select Call Waiting.
- Select the type of calls, Voice Calls or Data Calls. The screen informs you whether call waiting is activated or deactivated.
- Press the **Deactivate** soft key or the exercise key. The phone sends your settings to the network and the network's acknowledgement displays.

Network Selection (SIM Dependent)

The Network Selection feature enables you to automatically or manually select the network used when roaming outside of your home area.

Note: You can select a network other than your home network only if there is a valid roaming agreement between the two.

- From the Network Services menu screen, select Network Selection.
- 2. Select the options you want.

If you select **Automatic**, you are connected to the first available network when roaming.

If you select Manual, go to step 3.

 Select the network you want. The phone will scan for that network and you will be connected.

Caller ID

You can prevent your phone number from being displayed on the phone of the person you are calling.

Note: Some networks do not allow you to change this setting.

The following options are available:

- Default: the default setting provided by the network is used.
- Hide Number: you number does not display on the other person's phone.
- Send Number: your number is sent each time you make a call.

Closed User Group (SIM Dependent)

This network service allows incoming and outgoing calls to be restricted to a selected user group. you can create up to 10 user groups.

For details about how to create and use a closed user group, contact your service provider.

Example: A company lends SIM cards to its employees and wants to restrict outgoing calls to members of the same team.

If you select the **Closed User Group** menu, you can enter the CUG function. You can now access the following options:

Index List: lets you list, add, or delete CUG index numbers.

If there is no CUG index stored, you are prompted to add a new index when you select this option. Once you have added a CUG index, the list of current CUG indexes appears.

Add a new CUG index as advised by your service provider, or delete a group.

- Outside Access: lets you enable or disable calls to numbers other than those in the CUG. This feature depends on the nature of your CUG subscription. Please check with your service provider.
- Default Group: you may set a default CUG with your service provider. If you have done so, you can enable the Default Group option on your phone. When making a call, you are given the option of using your default CUG, instead of selecting one from the list.

Bluetooth

 Deactivate: deactivates the CUG function. This menu appears only when the default group is enabled or a CUG index is selected.

Band Selection

For the phone to make and receive phone calls, it must register with an available network. Your phone can handle any of the following types of networks:

- GSM 1800
- Combined GSM 850/1900

The country where you purchased your phone determines the default band that it uses. When you travel abroad, you must remember to change to an appropriate band.

- 1. From the Network Services menu screen, select **Band** Selection.
- 2. Select the appropriate option, and press the **OK** soft key or the e key.
- When the display confirms the network band you selected, press the Yes soft key or the a key. To cancel the selection, press the No soft key.

Bluetooth

Bluetooth is a short-range wireless communications technology capable of exchanging information over a distance of about 30 feet without requiring a physical connection.

Unlike infrared, you don't need to line up the devices to beam information with Bluetooth. If the devices are within a range of one another, you can exchange

information between them, even if they are located in different rooms.

The Bluetooth wireless technology settings menu provides the ability to view and change the device name, show the visibility, and set the security for the device.

Activation

When the Bluetooth is turned on, you can use the Bluetooth features available. When the Bluetooth is turned off, you cannot send or receive information via Bluetooth. To save battery life or in situations where Bluetooth use is prohibited, such as airline traveling, you can turn off the Bluetooth wireless technology headset.

My Devices

This menu provides a list of Bluetooth wireless technology devices discovered by your handset.

- 1. Highlight My Devices and press the Select soft key or the a key.
- To search for the Bluetooth device(s), highlight Search New Device and press the Select soft key or the key.

Connecting to a Bluetooth Device

From the Device list,

- Highlight the device and press the Select soft key or the key.
- **2.** Enter the PIN for the device.

If connecting to a Bluetooth wireless device consult your Bluetooth device user manual for your assigned PIN.

If connecting to another handset, enter a user-defined four to eight digit PIN.

Note: The first time you try to pair with a handset, you and the owner of the other handset must enter the same PIN.

Once the handsets are paired, you will not need to use the PIN again.

- 3. Press the **OK** soft key or the <u>()</u> key.
- 4. If you are unable to pair with the device a popup appears in the display. Press the **Yes** soft key to retry.

My Phone's Visibility

Allows other users to see your accessibility. Select **On** for other devices to see your device, or **Off** for no visibility.

My Phone's Name

Shows the handset name. You may change this name enter the text and press the 🤗 key.

Secure Mode

Secure Mode feature enables you to restrict other Bluetooth enable devices from discovering your device.

Bluetooth Services

Actually, the Bluetooth specification is a protocol that describes how the short-range wireless technology works, whereas individual profiles describe the services supported by individual devices. Profiles reduce the chance that different devices will not work together. Your phone supports the following profile services:

- Headset: enables outgoing and incoming calls.
- **Handsfree**: the remote carkit enables outgoing and incoming calls.
- Serial Port: the remote bluetooth device acts as a virtual serial port.
- **Dial-up**: the remote bluetooth device enables internet access through a phone modem.
- File Transfer: the remote bluetooth device enables users to transfer files from their handset to another.

Voice Recognition

Voice recognition allows your handset to be operated by spoken words. See "VoiceSignal" on page 49 for detailed information.

Security Settings

The Security feature enables you to restrict to use of your phone by others and to restrict the types of calls.

- 1. In Idle mode, press the Menu (
) soft key to access Menu mode.
- 2. Select Settings. Highlight Security and press the Select soft key or the (2) key.
- **3.** Select a menu and then change the setting. If the menu has submenus, repeat as necessary.
- 4. When you have finished, press the 🔜 key.

PIN Check

When the PIN Check feature is enabled, you must enter your PIN each time you switch on the phone.

Security Settings

Consequently, any person does not have your PIN cannot use your phone without your approval.

Note: Before disabling the PIN Check feature, you must enter your PIN.

The following options are available:

- **Disable**: the phone connects directly to the network when you switch it on.
- Enable: you must enter the PIN each time the phone is switched on.

Change PIN

This feature allows you to change your current PIN, provided that the PIN Check feature is enabled. You must enter the current PIN before you can specify a new one.

Once you have entered a new PIN, you are asked to confirm it by entering it again.

Phone Lock

When the Phone Lock feature is enabled, the phone is locked and you must enter the 4-8 digit phone password each time the phone is switched on.

The password it preset to "00000000" at the factory. To change the phone password, see the following Change Password option.

Once the correct password has been entered, you can use the phone until you switch it off.

The following options are available:

• **Disable**: you are not asked to enter the phone password when you switch on the phone.

• Enable: you are required to enter the phone password when you switch on the phone.

Change Password

The Change Password feature allows you to change your current phone password to a new one. You must enter the current phone password before you can specify a new one.

The password is preset to "00000000" at the factory. Once you have entered a new password, you are asked to confirm it by entering it again.

Privacy

Using this menu, you can lock your phone's contents requiring the phone's password to access the associated all functions except placing a call.

- 1. From the Security Menu, press Privacy.
- 2. Select Enable to lock and press the a key. Enter your password and press the **OK** soft key.
- Select Disable to unlock. Enter your password and press the OK soft key.

Note: This password is preset to "00000000" at the factory. To change this password, see "Change Password" on page 160.

SIM Lock

When the SIM Lock feature is enabled, your phone only works with the current SIM. You must enter the SIM lock code to unlock the SIM so you can use a different SIM card. Once you have entered the lock code, you are asked to confirm your entry.

FDN Mode (SIM Dependent)

FDN (Fixed Dial Number) mode, if supported by your SIM card, allows you to restrict your outgoing calls to a limited set of phone numbers.

The following options are available:

- Disable: you can call any number
- **Enable**: you can only call phone numbers stored in the Address Book. You must enter your PIN2.

Note: Not all SIM cards have a PIN2. If your SIM card does not, this menu does not display.

Change PIN2 (SIM Dependent)

The Change PIN2 feature allows you to change your current PIN2 to a new one. You must enter the current PIN2 before you can specify a new one. Once you have entered a new PIN2, you are asked to confirm it by entering it again.

Connection Settings

You can customize the profiles containing the settings for connecting your phone to the network. These settings are used for the WAP browser or Instant Messenger, or sending MMS messages or emails.

Note: Your phone connects to the network by default. If you change the MMS settings without first checking with your service provider, the WAP, MMS and Email features may not work properly.

The topics covered in this section allow you to schedule appointments, view the calendar, create To-Do lists, set an alarm, and perform simple math calculations.

Setting Alarms

You can set the alarm to ring at a specific time and set the weekly time frame. You can also set the phone to power on automatically and ring the alarm even if the phone is switched off.

Setting an Alarm

- 1. In Idle mode, press the **Menu** () soft key to access the menu mode.
- Select Games & Apps. Highlight Alarm and press the Select soft key or e key.
- 3. Select an alarm type
- Wake-up Call: the alarm rings to wake you up at the specified time.
- Single Use Alarm: the alarm rings only once and is then deactivated.
- Daily Alarm: the alarm rings every day at the same time.
- **Remove Alarm**: removes all alarm settings.
- Autopower: the alarm rings even when the phone is turned off.
- 4. Enter the time for the alarm to sound.

Note: Your phone is preset to a 12-hour format.

To change the alarm tone, press the **Options** soft key and select **Alarm Tone**. Select an alarm tone from the list.

- 5. Press the **OK** soft key or the <u>9</u> key.
- 6. If applicable, select AM or PM.

- If you select Wake-up Call in step 3, select a repeat option, Monday to Friday or Monday to Saturday.
- 8. When you have finished, press the 📰 key.

When the time for an alarm comes, press any key to stop the alarm.

Setting Autopower Alarms

You can set the alarm to ring even if the phone is powered off.

- 1. In Idle mode, press the **Menu** () soft key to access Menu mode.
- Select Games & Apps. Highlight Alarm and press the Select soft key or e key.
- 3. Select Autopower.
- Select Enable to activate the Autopower feature. The phone will automatically switch on to ring the alarm when the alarm time comes.

If the menu option is set to **Disable**, and the phone is switched off at the specified time, the alarm does not ring.

Deactivating Alarms

Health and Safety Information

Exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) Signals

Certification Information (SAR)

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the exposure limits for radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. government. These FCC exposure limits are derived from the recommendations of two expert organizations, the National Counsel on Radiation Protection and Measurement (NCRP) and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE). In both cases, the recommendations were developed by scientific and engineering experts drawn from industry, government, and academia after extensive reviews of the scientific literature related to the biological effects of RF energy.

The exposure limit set by the FCC for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR is a measure of the rate of absorption of RF energy by the human body expressed in units of watts per kilogram (W/kg). The FCC requires wireless phones to comply with a safety limit of 1.6 watts per kilogram (1.6 W/kg). The FCC exposure limit incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection to the public and to account for any variations in measurements. SAR tests are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the exposure limit established by the FCC. Tests for each model phone are performed in positions and locations (e.g. at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC. Body-worn operations are restricted to Samsung-supplied, approved, or non-Samsung designated accessories that have no metal and must provide at least 1.5 cm separation between the device, including its antenna (whether extended or retracted) and the user's body. Non-compliance with the above restrictions may result in violation of FCC RF exposure guidelines.

The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this mobile phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF exposure guidelines. The maximum SAR values for this model phone as reported to the FCC are:

- Head:1.01 W/Kg.
- Body-worn: 1.15 W/Kg.

SAR information on this and other model phones can be viewed on-line at www.fcc.gov/oet/fccid. To find information that pertains to a particular model phone, this site uses the phone FCC ID number which is usually printed somewhere on the case of the phone. Sometimes it may be necessary to remove the battery pack to find the number. Once you have the FCC ID number for a particular phone, follow the instructions on the website and it should provide values for typical or maximum SAR for a particular phone. Consumer Information on Wireless Phones

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has published a series of Questions and Answers for consumers relating to radio frequency (RF) exposure from wireless phones. The FDA publication includes the following information:

What kinds of phones are the subject of this update?

The term wireless phone refers here to hand-held wireless phones with built-in antennas, often called "cell," "mobile," or "PCS" phones. These types of wireless phones can expose the user to measurable radio frequency energy (RF) because of the short distance between the phone and the user's head. These RF exposures are limited by Federal Communications Commission safety guidelines that were developed with the advice of FDA and other federal health and safety agencies. When the phone is located at **220** greater distances from the user, the exposure to RF is drastically lower because a person's RF exposure decreases rapidly with increasing distance from the source. The so-called "cordless phones," which have a base unit connected to the telephone wiring in a house, typically operate at far lower power levels, and thus produce RF exposures well within the FCC's compliance limits.

Do wireless phones pose a health hazard?

The available scientific evidence does not show that any health problems are associated with using wireless phones. There is no proof, however, that wireless phones are absolutely safe. Wireless phones emit low levels of radio frequency energy (RF) in the microwave range while being used. They also emit very low levels of RF when in the stand-by mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce heating effects causes no known adverse health effects. Many studies of low level RF exposures have not found any biological effects. Some studies have suggested that some biological effects may occur, but such findings have not been confirmed by additional research. In some cases, other researchers have had difficulty in reproducing those studies, or in determining the reasons for inconsistent results.

What is FDA's role concerning the safety of wireless phones?

Under the law, FDA does not review the safety of radiation-emitting consumer products such as wireless phones before they can be sold, as it does with new drugs

or medical devices. However, the agency has authority to take action if wireless phones are shown to emit radio frequency energy (RF) at a level that is hazardous to the user. In such a case, FDA could require the manufacturers of wireless phones to notify users of the health hazard and to repair, replace or recall the phones so that the hazard no longer exists.

Although the existing scientific data do not justify FDA regulatory actions, FDA has urged the wireless phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:

- "Support needed research into possible biological effects of RF of the type emitted by wireless phones;
- "Design wireless phones in a way that minimizes any RF exposure to the user that is not necessary for device function; and
- "Cooperate in providing users of wireless phones with the best possible information on possible effects of wireless phone use on human health.

FDA belongs to an interagency working group of the federal agencies that have responsibility for different aspects of RF safety to ensure coordinated efforts at the federal level. The following agencies belong to this working group:

- "National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health
- "Environmental Protection Agency
- "Federal Communications Commission
- "Occupational Safety and Health Administration
- "National Telecommunications and Information Administration

The National Institutes of Health participates in some interagency working group activities, as well.

FDA shares regulatory responsibilities for wireless phones with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). All phones that are sold in the United States must comply with FCC safety guidelines that limit RF exposure. FCC relies on FDA and other health agencies for safety questions about wireless phones.

FCC also regulates the base stations that the wireless phone networks rely upon. While these base stations operate at higher power than do the wireless phones themselves, the RF exposures that people get from these base stations are typically thousands of times lower than those they can get from wireless phones. Base stations are thus not the primary subject of the safety questions discussed in this document.

What are the results of the research done already?

The research done thus far has produced conflicting results, and many studies have suffered from flaws in their research methods. Animal experiments investigating the effects of radio frequency energy (RF) exposures characteristic of wireless phones have yielded conflicting results that often cannot be repeated in other laboratories. A few animal studies, however, have suggested that low levels of RF could accelerate the development of cancer in laboratory animals. However, many of the studies that showed increased tumor development used animals that had been genetically engineered or treated with cancer-causing chemicals so as to be pre-disposed to develop cancer in absence of RF exposure. Other studies exposed the animals to RF for up

to 22 hours per day. These conditions are not similar to the conditions under which people use wireless phones, so we don't know with certainty what the results of such studies mean for human health.

Three large epidemiology studies have been published since December 2000. Between them, the studies investigated any possible association between the use of wireless phones and primary brain cancer, glioma, meningioma, or acoustic neuroma, tumors of the brain or salivary gland, leukemia, or other cancers. None of the studies demonstrated the existence of any harmful health effects from wireless phones RF exposures. However, none of the studies can answer questions about long-term exposures, since the average period of phone use in these studies was around three years.

What research is needed to decide whether RF exposure from wireless phones poses a health risk?

A combination of laboratory studies and epidemiological studies of people actually using wireless phones would provide some of the data that are needed. Lifetime animal exposure studies could be completed in a few years. However, very large numbers of animals would be needed to provide reliable proof of a cancer promoting effect if one exists. Epidemiological studies can provide data that is directly applicable to human populations, but ten or more years' follow-up may be needed to provide answers about some health effects, such as cancer. This is because the interval between the time of exposure to a cancer-causing agent and the time tumors develop - if they do - may be many, many years. The interpretation of epidemiological studies is hampered by difficulties in measuring actual RF exposure during day-to-day use of wireless phones. Many factors affect this measurement, such as the angle at which the phone is held, or which model of phone is used.

What is FDA doing to find out more about the possible health effects of wireless phone RF?

FDA is working with the U.S. National Toxicology Program and with groups of investigators around the world to ensure that high priority animal studies are conducted to address important questions about the effects of exposure to radio frequency energy (RF).

FDA has been a leading participant in the World Health Organization international Electromagnetic Fields (EMF) Project since its inception in 1996. An influential result of this work has been the development of a detailed agenda of research needs that has driven the establishment of new research programs around the world. The Project has also helped develop a series of public information documents on EMF issues.

FDA and Cellular Telecommunications & Internet Association (CTIA) have a formal Cooperative Research and Development Agreement (CRADA) to do research on wireless phone safety. FDA provides the scientific oversight, obtaining input from experts in government, industry, and academic organizations. CTIA-funded research is conducted through contracts to independent investigators. The initial research will include both laboratory studies and studies of wireless phone users. The CRADA will also include a broad assessment of additional research needs in the context of the latest research developments around the world.

What steps can I take to reduce my exposure to radio frequency energy from my wireless phone?

If there is a risk from these products - and at this point we do not know that there is - it is probably very small. But if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your exposure to radio frequency energy (RF). Since time is a key factor in how much exposure a person receives, reducing the amount of time spent using a wireless phone will reduce RF exposure.

 "If you must conduct extended conversations by wireless phone every day, you could place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, since the exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. For example, you could use a headset and carry the wireless phone away from your body or use a wireless phone connected to a remote antenna.

Again, the scientific data do not demonstrate that wireless phones are harmful. But if you are concerned about the RF exposure from these products, you can use measures like those described above to reduce your RF exposure from wireless phone use.

What about children using wireless phones?

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to users of wireless phones, including children and teenagers. If you want to take steps to lower exposure to radio frequency energy (RF), the measures described above would apply to children and teenagers using wireless phones. Reducing the time of wireless phone use and increasing the distance between the user and the RF source will reduce RF exposure.

Some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all. For example, the government in the United Kingdom distributed leaflets containing such a recommendation in December 2000. They noted that no evidence exists that using a wireless phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their recommendation to limit wireless phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists.

Do hands-free kits for wireless phones reduce risks from exposure to RF emissions?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that hands-free kits reduce risks. Hands-free kits can be used with wireless phones for convenience and comfort. These systems reduce the absorption of RF energy in the head because the phone, which is the source of the RF emissions, will not be placed against the head. On the other hand, if the phone is mounted against the waist or other part of the body during use, then that part of the body will absorb more RF energy. Wireless phones marketed in the U.S. are required to meet safety requirements regardless of whether they are used against the head or against the body. Either configuration should result in compliance with the safety limit.

Do wireless phone accessories that claim to shield the head from RF radiation work?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to

believe that accessories that claim to shield the head from those emissions reduce risks. Some products that claim to shield the user from RF absorption use special phone cases, while others involve nothing more than a metallic accessory attached to the phone. Studies have shown that these products generally do not work as advertised. Unlike "hand-free" kits, these so-called "shields" may interfere with proper operation of the phone. The phone may be forced to boost its power to compensate, leading to an increase in RF absorption. In February 2002, the Federal trade Commission (FTC) charged two companies that sold devices that claimed to protect wireless phone users from radiation with making false and unsubstantiated claims. According to FTC, these defendants lacked a reasonable basis to substantiate their claim.

What about wireless phone interference with medical equipment?

Radio frequency energy (RF) from wireless phones can interact with some electronic devices. For this reason, FDA helped develop a detailed test method to measure electromagnetic interference (EMI) of implanted cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators from wireless telephones. This test method is now part of a standard sponsored by the Association for the Advancement of Medical instrumentation (AAMI). The final draft, a joint effort by FDA, medical device manufacturers, and many other groups, was completed in late 2000. This standard will allow manufacturers to ensure that cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators are safe from wireless phone EMI. FDA has tested wireless phones and helped develop a voluntary standard sponsored by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE). This standard specifies test methods and performance requirements for hearing aids and wireless phones so that no interference occurs when a person uses a compatible phone and a compatible hearing aid at the same time. This standard was approved by the IEEE in 2000.

FDA continues to monitor the use of wireless phones for possible interactions with other medical devices. Should harmful interference be found to occur, FDA will conduct testing to assess the interference and work to resolve the problem.

Road Safety

Your wireless phone gives you the powerful ability to communicate by voice, almost anywhere, anytime. But an important responsibility accompanies the benefits of wireless phones, one that every user must uphold.

When driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. When using your wireless phone behind the wheel of a car, practice good common sense and remember the following tips:

- Get to know your wireless phone and its features, such as speed dial and redial. If available, these features help you to place your call without taking your attention off the road.
- When available, use a hands-free device. If possible, add an additional layer of convenience and safety to your wireless phone with one of the many hands free accessories available today.
- Position your wireless phone within easy reach. Be able to access your wireless phone without removing your eyes from the road. If you get an incoming call at an inconvenient time, let your voice mail answer it for you.
- 4. Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow, ice and even heavy traffic can be hazardous.

- Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving. Jotting down a "to do" list or flipping through your address book takes attention away from your primary responsibility, driving safely.
- 6. Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when you are not moving or before pulling into traffic. Try to plan calls when your car will be stationary. If you need to make a call while moving, dial only a few numbers, check the road and your mirrors, then continue.
- Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting. Make people you are talking with aware you are driving and suspend conversations that have the potential to divert your attention from the road.
- 8. Use your wireless phone to call for help. Dial 9-1-1 or other local emergency number in the case of fire, traffic accident or medical emergencies. Remember, it is a free call on your wireless phone!
- 9. Use your wireless phone to help others in emergencies. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 9-1-1 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.
- 10. Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless assistance number when necessary. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no

one appears injured, or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency number.

Operating Environment

Remember to follow any special regulations in force in any area

and always switch your phone off whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger. When connecting the phone or any accessory to another device, read its user's guide for detailed safety instructions. Do not connect incompatible products.

As with other mobile radio transmitting equipment, users are advised that for the satisfactory operation of the equipment and

for the safety of personnel, it is recommended that the equipment should only be used in the normal operating position (held to your ear with the antenna pointing over your shoulder).

Using Your Phone Near Other Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals **232** from your wireless phone. Consult the manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum distance of 15 cm (6 inches) be maintained between a wireless phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker.

These recommendations are consistent with the independent research and recommendations of Wireless Technology Research.

Persons with pacemakers:

- should always keep the phone more than 15 cm (6 inches) from their pacemaker when the phone is switched on.
- should not carry the phone in a breast pocket.
- should use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize potential interference.

If you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place, switch your phone off immediately.

Hearing Aid Compatibility with Mobile Phones

When some mobile phones are used near some hearing devices (hearing aids and cochlear implants), users may detect a buzzing, humming, or whining noise. Some hearing devices are more immune than others to this interference noise, and phones also vary in the amount of interference they generate.

The wireless telephone industry has developed ratings for some of their mobile phones, to assist hearing device users in finding phones that may be compatible with their hearing devices. Not all phones have been rated. Phones that are rated have the rating on their box or a label on the box.

The ratings are not guarantees. Results will vary depending on the user's hearing device and hearing loss. If your hearing device happens to be vulnerable to interference, you may not be able to use a rated phone successfully. Trying out the phone with your hearing device is the best way to evaluate it for your personal needs.

- M-Ratings: Phones rated M3 or M4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than phones that are not labeled. M4 is the better/higher of the two ratings.
- T-Ratings: Phones rated T3 or T4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to be more usable with a hearing device's telecoil ("T Switch" or "Telephone Switch") than unrated phones. T4 is the better/higher of the two ratings. (Note that not all hearing devices have telecoils in them.)

Hearing devices may also be measured for immunity to this type of interference. Your hearing device manufacturer or hearing health professional may help you find results for your hearing device. The more immune your hearing aid is, the less likely you are to experience interference noise from mobile phones.

Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information. Switch your phone off in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle. You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

Posted Facilities

Switch your phone off in any facility where posted notices requireyou to do so.

Potentially Explosive Environments

Switch your phone off when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Users are advised to switch the phone off while at a refueling point (service station). Users are reminded of the need to observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots (fuel storage and distribution areas), chemical plants or where blasting operations are in progress.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often but not always clearly marked. They include below deck on boats, chemical transfer or storage facilities, vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane), areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust or metal powders, and any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine.

Emergency Calls

This phone, like any wireless phone, operates using radio signals, wireless and landline networks as well as userprogrammed functions, which cannot guarantee connection in all conditions. Therefore, you should never rely solely on any wireless phone for essential communications (medical emergencies, for example).

Remember, to make or receive any calls the phone must be switched on and in a service area with adequate signal strength. Emergency calls may not be possible on all wireless phone networks or when certain network services and/or phone features are in use. Check with local service providers.

To make an emergency call:

- 1. If the phone is not on, switch it on.
- Key in the emergency number for your present location (for example, 911 or other official emergency number). Emergency numbers vary by location.
- 3. Press the 💽 key.

If certain features are in use (call barring, for example), you may

first need to deactivate those features before you can make an emergency call. Consult this document and your local cellular service provider.

When making an emergency call, remember to give all the necessary information as accurately as possible. Remember that your phone may be the only means of communication at the scene of an accident; do not cut off the call until given permission to do so.

Restricting Children's access to your Phone

Your phone is not a toy. Children should not be allowed to play

with it because they could hurt themselves and others, damage the phone or make calls that increase your phone bill.

FCC Notice and Cautions

FCC Notice

The phone may cause TV or radio interference if used in close proximity to receiving equipment. The FCC can require you to stop using the phone if such interference cannot be eliminated.

Vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane) must comply with the National Fire Protection Standard (NFPA-58). For a copy of this standard, contact the National Fire Protection Association, One Batterymarch Park, Quincy, MA 02269, Attn: Publication Sales Division.

Cautions

Any changes or modifications to your phone not expressly approved in this document could void your warranty for this equipment, and void your authority to operate this equipment. Only use approved batteries, antennas and chargers. The use of any unauthorized accessories may be dangerous and void the phone warranty if said accessories cause damage or a defect to the phone.

Although your phone is quite sturdy, it is a complex piece of equipment and can be broken. Avoid dropping, hitting, bending or sitting on it.

Other Important Safety Information

- Only qualified personnel should service the phone or install the phone in a vehicle. Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty applicable to the device.
- Check regularly that all wireless phone equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly.
- Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases or explosive materials in the same compartment as the phone, its parts or accessories.
- For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that an air bag inflates with great force. Do not place objects, including both installed or portable wireless equipment in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.
- Switch your phone off before boarding an aircraft. The use of wireless phone in aircraft is illegal and may be dangerous to the aircraft's operation.

Product Performance

Getting the Most Out of Your Signal Reception

The quality of each call you make or receive depends on the signal strength in your area. Your phone informs you of the current signal strength by displaying a number of bars next to the signal strength icon. The more bars displayed, the stronger the signal.

If you're inside a building, being near a window may give you better reception.

Understanding the Power Save Feature

If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. If your phone is active, it periodically rechecks service availability or you can check it yourself by pressing any key.

Anytime the Power Save feature is activated, a message displays on the screen. When a signal is found, your phone returns to Idle mode.

Understanding How Your Phone Operates

Your phone is basically a radio transmitter and receiver. When it's turned on, it receives and transmits radio frequency (RF) signals. When you use your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level. This power can range from 0.006 watts to 0.2 watts in digital mode.

Maintaining Your Phone's Peak Performance

For the best care of your phone, only authorized personnel should service your phone and accessories. Faulty service may void the warranty.

There are several simple guidelines to operating your phone properly and maintaining safe, satisfactory service.

- Hold the phone with the antenna raised, fully-extended and over your shoulder.
- Try not to hold, bend or twist the phone's antenna.
- Don't use the phone if the antenna is damaged.
- · Speak directly into the phone's receiver.
- Avoid exposing your phone and accessories to rain or liquid spills. If your phone does get wet, immediately turn the power off and remove the battery. If it is inoperable, call Customer Care for service.

Availability of Various Features/Ring Tones

Many services and features are network dependent and may require additional subscription and/or usage charges. Not all features are available for purchase or use in all areas. Downloadable Ring Tones may be available at an additional cost. Other conditions and restrictions may apply. See your service provider for additional information.

Battery Standby and Talk Time

Standby and talk times will vary depending on phone usage patterns and conditions. Battery power consumption depends on factors such as network configuration, signal strength, operating temperature, features selected, frequency of calls, and voice, data, and other application usage patterns.

Battery Precautions

- Never use any charger or battery that is damaged in any way.
- Use the battery only for its intended purpose.
- If you use the phone near the network's base station, it uses less power; talk and standby time are greatly affected by the signal strength on the cellular network and the parameters set by the network operator.
- Battery charging time depends on the remaining battery charge and the type of battery and charger used. The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times, but it will gradually wear out. When the operation time (talk time and standby time) is noticeably shorter than normal, it is time to buy a new battery.
- If left unused, a fully charged battery will discharge itself over time.
- Use only Samsung-approved batteries and recharge your battery only with Samsung-approved chargers. When a charger is not in use, disconnect it from the power source. Do not leave the battery connected to a charger for more than a week, since overcharging may shorten its life.
- Extreme temperatures will affect the charging capacity of your battery: it may require cooling or warming first.
- Do not leave the battery in hot or cold places, such as in a car in summer or winter conditions, as you will reduce the capacity and lifetime of the battery. Always try to keep the battery at room temperature. A phone with a hot or cold battery may temporarily not work, even when the battery is fully charged. Li-ion batteries are particularly affected by temperatures below 0 °C (32 °F).

- Do not short-circuit the battery. Accidental short- circuiting can occur when a metallic object (coin, clip or pen) causes a direct connection between the + and - terminals of the battery (metal strips on the battery), for example when you carry a spare battery in a pocket or bag. Short-circuiting the terminals may damage the battery or the object causing the short-circuiting.
- Dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations. In some areas, the disposal of batteries in household or business trash may be prohibited. For safe disposal options for Li-lon batteries, contact your nearest Samsung authorized service center. Always recycle. Do not dispose of batteries in a fire.

Care and Maintenance

Your phone is a product of superior design and craftsmanship and should be treated with care. The suggestions below will help you fulfill any warranty obligations and allow you to enjoy this product for many years

- Keep the phone and all its parts and accessories out of the reach of small children's.
